Message from our President Nancy Acre

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Recently, Glen and I were very fortunate to be able to check off another item on our "Bucket List!"

In Late January, we attended three days of the seven day Barrett-Jackson Auto Auction in Scottsdale, Arizona. This event is considered by many car enthusiasts to be the Granddaddy of all car auctions!

As you may know, David Pierce travels to car shows more than most of the members of the club. He highly recommended this trip as he was also going to attend this year. So we decided to go, and we were not disappointed.

To simply say that it is an Auction is very misleading. The bidding/auction part of the venue is only about ten percent of what is happening there. There are literally hundreds of vendors, mostly involving car stuff but also the high-end clothes, leather goods, boots, furniture, jewel-ry, memorabilia, etc., something for everyone! There were over 100 exhibitors, many name brand food vendors, demonstrations of produces and even a ride/drive experience. There were TV monitors hung high in the arena all along the walls so you could see what was being auctioned. Occasionally you would see guys come and get a car out of the display area and take it into the auction block. Then of course, cars, cars, and more cars- all in pristine condition! Everything from the earliest luxury models to the world introduction of the 2018 Acura NSX-Type R. Thousands of cars were available to get up close and really inspect. All the cars to be auctioned as well as some just there for display were available to all paid attendees. We were allowed to get up close, take pictures with the cars and/or owners, and everyone was quite friendly. I enjoyed seeing the upside – down Corvette displays where the undercarriage modifications were shown.

Our typical day started about 8:30 am, walking around and enjoying all the activities, having lunch at a well-known vendor, and doing a lot of walking. We usually left mid-afternoon. The ride/drive activities were offered by GM, Ford, and Dodge. You can sign a release and ride in a Z06, a Mustang GT and Viper and a Hellcat. After taking a police-officer administered breathalyzer test for each manufacturer, you can drive a performance car, like the Camaro SS (what I drove), or a production Ford GT. The shortened "drag race" was a ride along between two Hellcats – my driver and car beat Glen's driver and car! There were other opportunities to see live TV in action, including preparation, driving cars into and out of the auction block and you could even sit in the back of the bidding arena, if seats were empty. We discovered that by going early in the morning, the crowd was smaller at the auction and we did sit and watch bidding for a while. The bidding goes on all day every day, but you only see snippets of the auction on the TV shows! This experience was all inclusive in the daily admission pricing package.

We highly recommend this experience as one of many, that car enthusiasts enjoy on our journey in the car world. We will probably go again! See <u>www.barrett-jackson.com</u> for details. Next year, the show is January 14 – 22, 2017. You purchase daily tickets for the day's activities you want to attend. We attended Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, because it really gets crowded as the final auction days approaches. If you like everything to do with old (looking new) and new performance cars, take good walking shoes, make your hotel reservation early, and rental car reservations, if flying (from Little Rock to Phoenix is a two hour nonstop flight). It is a very exciting place to be.


At one point in its life, this 1959 Chevrolet Corvette 🖄 was sold for \$800. Two men each split the cost to acquire this car back in 1974, but now it's destined to cross an auction block in Arizona for a far greater figure. Let's back up a bit, though, as the story of the Purple People Eater runs deeper than this. What we're dealing with here is an iconic American race car that dominated nearly every race it entered.

In 1958, the Chicago-based Nickey Chevrolet ordered up a <u>Corvette</u> to take to the race track. It arrived wearing standard silver paint. While out on the track, its owner felt that it was hard to see among the other race cars all wearing from-the-factory paint. So the car was sent into the dealership's paint booth and it came out on the other side with its unique metallic purple color scheme.

Upon the recommendation of none other than Zora Arkus-Duntov himself, the owners hired Jim Jeffords to helm the machine in the 1959 SCCA-B season. With a fuel-injected 290-horsepower, 283 cubic-inch V-8 under the hood, the car placed first in every race that year, except the last race of the season. It dominated the field and secured the title, and all while flying those stand-out purple colors.

In 1961, the car was sold, repainted, and raced a bit but it fell into obscurity quickly. It was at the first Carlisle swap-meet event in 1974 that Chip Miller and Ken Heckert split the \$800 asking price for the car. The pair initially had no clue as to the car they'd just acquired, and it even served as an auto shop lunch table for nearly 14 years before someone took notice of what was sitting before them.

The car was restored, and now it's heading to the Barrett-Jackson Auction, which is scheduled for January 23-31, 2016 in Scottsdale, Arizona. We wouldn't be surprised if this 'Vette helps some well-heeled bidder separate seven figures from his or her bank account.




